


The Tucson Indian Center celebrated 60 years of service to the greater Tucson community. TIC has been providing advocacy, education, enhanced leadership, and strengthening the wellbeing of the Urban Native American Community. The Haven was able to sponsor the event and show support. Earlier in the year due to collaboration efforts and a positive tour of the Haven, TIC named the Haven as a legitimate provider for indigenous women in pamphlets that are widely distributed to the community. In the face of fraudulent actors, this sets the Haven apart as community resource.

Indigenous Peoples Day was proclaimed on October 11, 2021 by president Biden to honor America's original inhabitants. Taking the place of Columbus Day, this action solidifies the sovereignty of Tribes and Nations as present before "America was discovered" by Christopher Coumbus.
