We organized our Chrysalis Luncheon for the first time after a 3 year break. The event took place in April and our honoree was The Haven's former Executive Director Margaret Higgins.




















Severe substance use disorders by category




Mental Health Diagnoses



Prevalence of Social Determinants of Health




Mental Health diagnoses


